vicinity of Dysart Woods. And as I said, neither I nor the Ohio Valley Coal Company president and general manager have made any decision on what's going to be done in the vicinity of Dysart Woods, let alone the trees.

We have done thirteen years of research by two universities and two agencies who have determined there is no connection between trees and underground mining of coal. But, nevertheless, I have a lot of constituencies to balance. And I respect those who want to preserve the environment, because I'm 62, almost, and I want to leave that legacy, too. I've got three sons in the business.

So I've got customers who depend upon me for low-cost coal, for low-cost electricity in Ohio. I've got employees that depend on me. I've got lenders that want to be paid back. And I'm very much in debt, and I have been since the day I went in the coal business. And I've got the regulatory people. I've got my family and I've got God. And then out there I've got the public in general, as those environmentalists are there.

And you know what, as the environmentalists, I want to leave a proper legacy. No pound of coal is worth destroying the environment. But on the other hand, I have to balance all these constituencies and decide --
